

EXPRESS - MEANDER MARK


In Sweden and Finland, if a letter required a quick delivery, this was signified by adding one or more feathers in a wax seal (three maximum). Known in Sweden as a Fjäderbrev. A postal marking, a wavy line (known as a meander) with a horizontal line through it was also added to indicate that the letter had to be taken direct without any deviation



1800 Express Letter - Letters from this service are known used between 1760 and 1840


EXPRESS - MEANDER MARK - FEATHER LETTER

A copy of the letter (reduced) shown on the previous sheet, together with a copy of another "Feather Letter" reputed to have been a "Swedish Royal Feather letter" carried on Royal business through the Swedish Royal Crown Post to Helsinki

3 January, 1774, Official Proclamation posted during the time of King Gustaf III Contents written in Swedish. Contains two feathers indicating the level of urgency, both embedded in red sealing wax

Copy of 1800 Letter
